# Partnership with College of DuPage A.A.S. Criminal Justice to B.A. Criminology

Through a new partnership between the College of DuPage and DePaul University, students who are pursuing the A.A.S. in Criminal Justice can now receive **guaranteed transfer admission** through the DePaul Admission Partnership Program (DAPP) and complete courses in the A.A.S. degree which will meet the requirements of the first two years of study in the Bachelor of Arts in Criminology at DePaul.
