LETTER TO THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY

University Colleagues,

On behalf of the Division of Enrollment Management and Marketing, I am pleased to present DePaul's 2018 enrollment summary. This annual report describes the current enrollment profile and how it has changed over recent years.

Overall, the university enrolled 22,437 students this fall, nearly 2 percent over budgeted expectations. These students registered for 279,904 credits, nearly 3,000 more than the target. These are important outcomes for the university and strong indicators for subsequent quarters.

As a tuition-dependent institution, new student enrollment is critical to meeting not only our current commitments but also our future aspirations. This fall, we enrolled the second-largest freshman class in university history. The class is noteworthy for its academic profile, as demonstrated by a record 310 freshmen in the University Honors Program.

Strong gains in CDM, COE and CSH led to nearly 2 percent more new master's students enrolled this year than last. These gains helped push graduate and professional credit hours over budgeted targets by 2 percent.

DePaul's broad academic portfolio underpins this fall's successful enrollment outcomes by smoothing the volatility of programs in decline with growth in programs on the upswing, including recently introduced programs. CDM surpassed its budgeted target by 3 percent, fueled by continued growth in cinematic arts programs. LAS surpassed its budgeted goal by 3 percent as well, benefiting from 100 students enrolling in the new criminology program.

The examples above demonstrate the importance of balancing the enrollment mix to achieve institutional objectives. Faced with an intensifying competitive, demographic and economic landscape, our ability to navigate challenges and opportunities on multiple fronts will determine our future success.

Helping chart our course is the university's new strategic plan, "Grounded in Mission: The Plan for DePaul 2024," which provides a framework and vision for building upon the university's past accomplishments. Enrollment will play a key role in achieving the plan's ambitious goals.

But as with any plan, Grounded in Mission will only be as successful as we are in implementing it. In that, we are fortunate, because of the extraordinarily talented and dedicated faculty and staff at DePaul. Thank you for all that you do.

UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT

DePaul remains the nation's largest Catholic university for the 21st consecutive year, with a total student enrollment of 22,437.

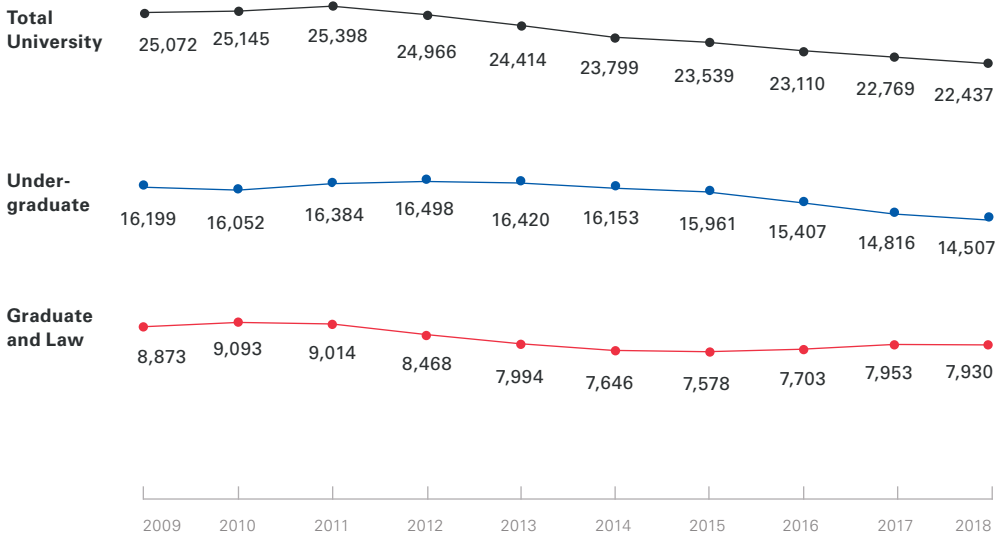
Undergraduate Enrollment – 14,507 students enrolled this fall, compared with 14,816 in 2017. Undergraduate enrollment accounts for 65 percent of total enrollment in 2018, compared with 68 percent in 2014.

Graduate Enrollment – 7,136 students enrolled this fall, compared with 7,130 in 2017, accounting for 32 percent of university enrollment.

Law Enrollment – 794 students enrolled this fall, compared with 823 in 2017. Law enrollment accounts for 4 percent of university enrollment.

Students registered for 279,904 credit hours in fall 2018. Seventy-seven percent of these credit hours were generated by undergraduate courses and 23 percent by graduate and law courses.

UNDERGRADUATE ENROLLMENT

DePaul enrolled 14,507 undergraduates this fall, compared with 14,816 in 2017. Undergraduate enrollment has declined 10 percent from 16,153 students in 2014, driven disproportionately by a decline in part-time enrollment. While full-time enrollment has declined 6 percent since 2014, part-time enrollment has declined 32 percent.

Full-Time and Part-Time Undergraduate Enrollment

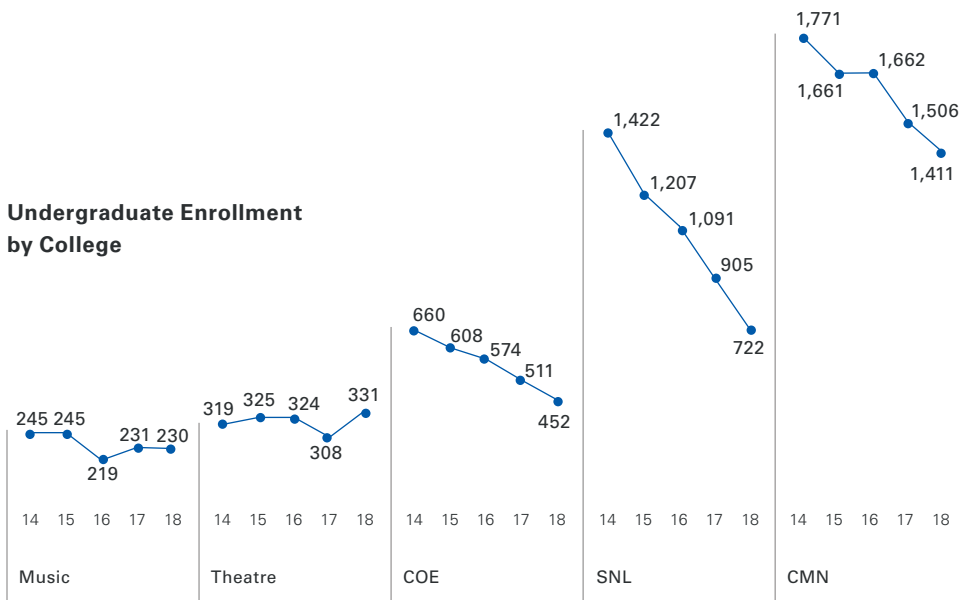

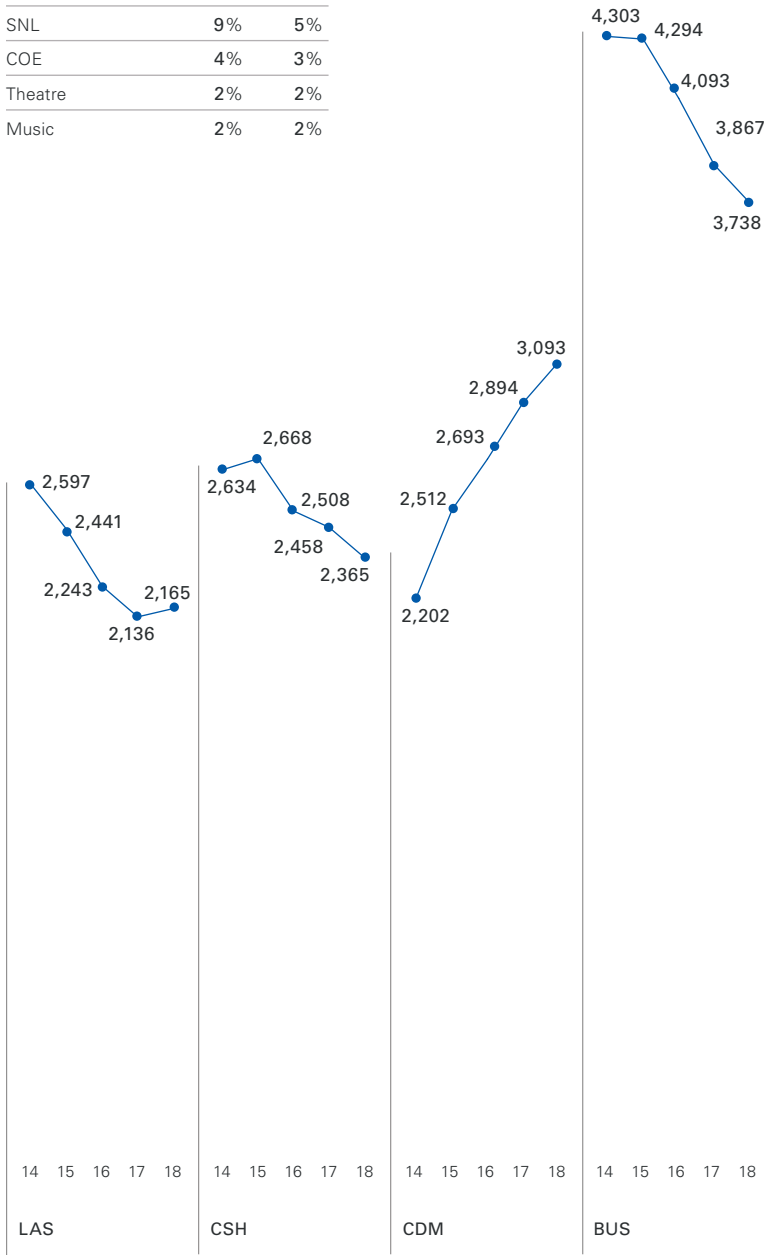
Undergraduate Enrollment by College

FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT

DePaul welcomed a class of 2,575 new freshmen in fall 2018, the second-largest freshman class in DePaul’s history and an increase of 33 students, compared with 2,542 students in 2017. Enrollment increased in CDM, LAS and Theatre, with LAS and Theatre growing by more than 10 percentage points over 2017. BUS continues to enroll the largest proportion of freshmen at 25 percent.

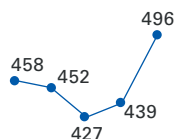
By Academic Profile

The freshman class is strong on all measures of academic preparedness.

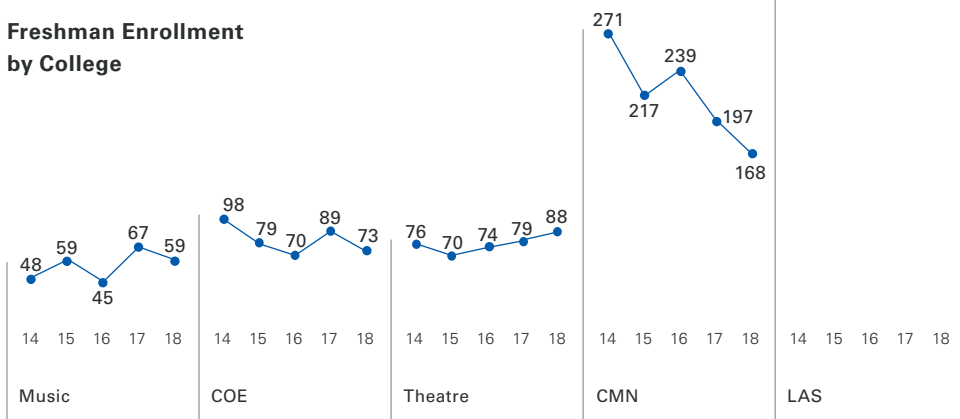
- » The average high school GPA—the best predictor of academic success at DePaul—is 3.67, the highest in university history and up from 3.60 in 2017.
- » The average SAT composite score of all DePaul freshmen is 1184*. The middle 50 percent of the class scored between 1090 and 1280. Nationally, the average SAT composite score is 1060.
- » About 12 percent of the freshman class, or 310 students, enrolled in the University Honors Program** in fall 2018, compared with 247 in 2017. The average SAT composite score for new honors students is 1300.
- » Freshmen came from almost 1,000 high schools, with the top 25 high schools accounting for 20 percent of the class. Freshmen enrolled in nearly 100 different majors.

* SAT average includes scores for students who applied through the test-optional program and submitted scores post-admission for research purposes. Due to the transition of Illinois high schools from ACT to SAT, the DePaul average represents students with SAT scores and does not include 870 students who provided only ACT scores.

** There are five other college- and discipline-specific honors programs at DePaul. The information presented here does not include those programs.



Freshman Enrollment by College



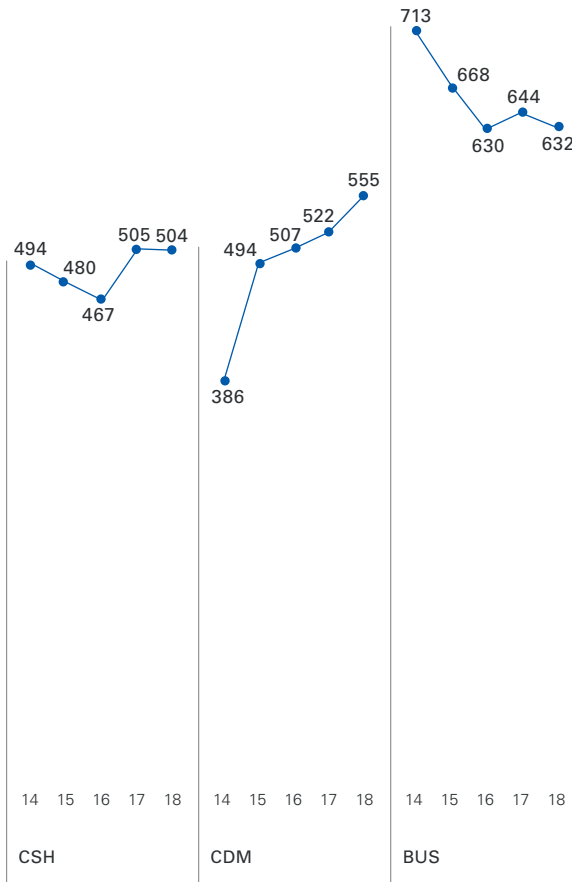

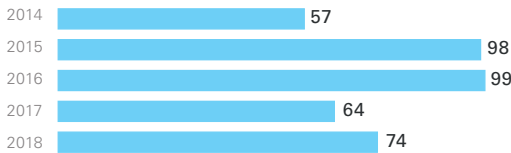
TRANSFER ENROLLMENT

A total of 1,272 transfer students enrolled this fall, an increase of 2 percent from 2017. This increase comes after two years of declining transfer enrollment and was due primarily to a 12 percent increase in adult transfer students (24 years of age and older). Enrolling in fall 2018 were 925 traditional-age transfer students (under 24 years of age) and 347 adult transfer students, compared with 932 and 311, respectively, in 2017.

The three largest colleges for total new transfer enrollment—BUS, CDM and LAS—together enrolled 66 percent of new transfers. Enrollment in SNL, BUS, CDM, COE, CMN and Music increased over 2017, with declines in the other colleges. Sixty-two percent of transfers came from Illinois community colleges. Forty-two percent of this fall’s new transfers entered DePaul with sophomore status, and 39 percent with junior status. Eighty-seven percent of new transfers are full-time students, compared with 91 percent in 2017.

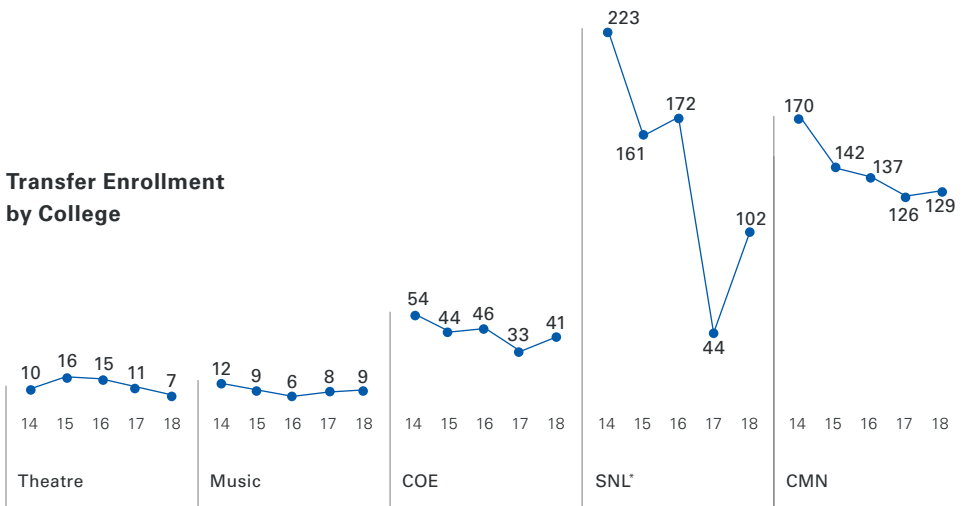
Transfer students remain an important component of DePaul’s enrollment profile. This fall, transfers account for 33 percent of new degree-seeking undergraduates, the same as 2017. Sixty-four percent of transfers in 2017-18 began their enrollment in fall quarter, compared with 65 percent in 2013-14. Throughout 2017-18, DePaul enrolled a total of 1,933 transfer students and 2,491 freshmen.

Transfer Enrollment by College

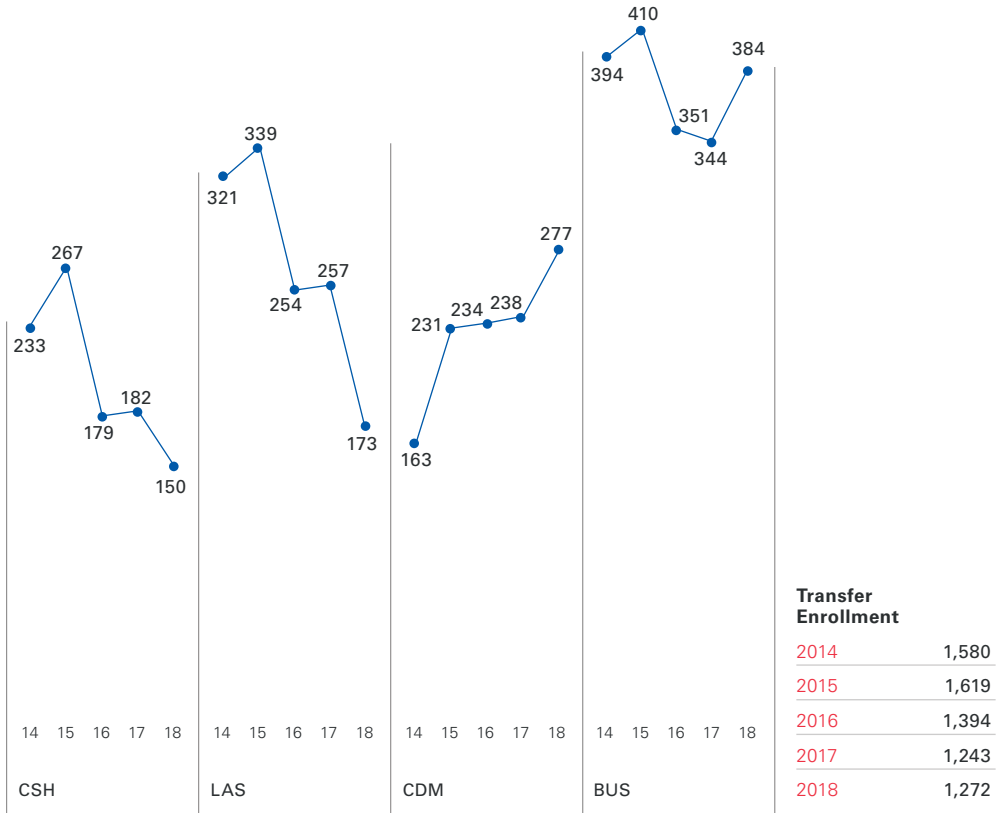

Freshmen

By Gender

- » Less than half of all new freshmen are male (41 percent) in 2018.
- » Enrollment in LAS, CSH, CMN and COE is more than 70 percent female.

By Geography

- » 47 percent come from suburban Chicago or elsewhere in Illinois, 35 percent from out of state or out of country, and 18 percent from the city of Chicago.
- » California is the top state for freshmen (other than Illinois), sending 118 new freshmen this fall. Rounding out the top five are Michigan, Ohio, Minnesota and Wisconsin.
- » 40 percent of African-American freshmen and 49 percent of multiracial students come from out of state, compared with 20 percent of Hispanic students and 16 percent of Asian and Pacific Islander students.
- » 68 percent of new freshmen live on campus.

First-Generation Freshmen

- » Enrolling this fall are 846 freshmen from families where neither parent has a bachelor's degree. First-generation students represent 33 percent of the freshman class.
- » Over one-third of new freshmen in BUS, CSH and COE are first-generation.
- » 47 percent of this year's first-generation students come from suburban Chicago.

- » Over half of all new transfers are male (52 percent).
- » Transfer enrollment in Theatre, CSH and CMN is more than 65 percent female.

By Geography

- DePaul remains a top destination for transfer students in Illinois.
- » 62 percent of transfers are from Illinois community colleges.
 - » 25 percent are from out-of-state institutions.
 - » 7 percent are from Illinois private four-year institutions.
 - » 4 percent are from Illinois public four-year universities.

By Age

- » 73 percent of new transfers are under 24, 17 percent are 24-29 years of age, and 10 percent are 30 or older.
- » Transfer adults (24 and older) enrolled in all colleges except Music, with the largest numbers in SNL, BUS and CDM.

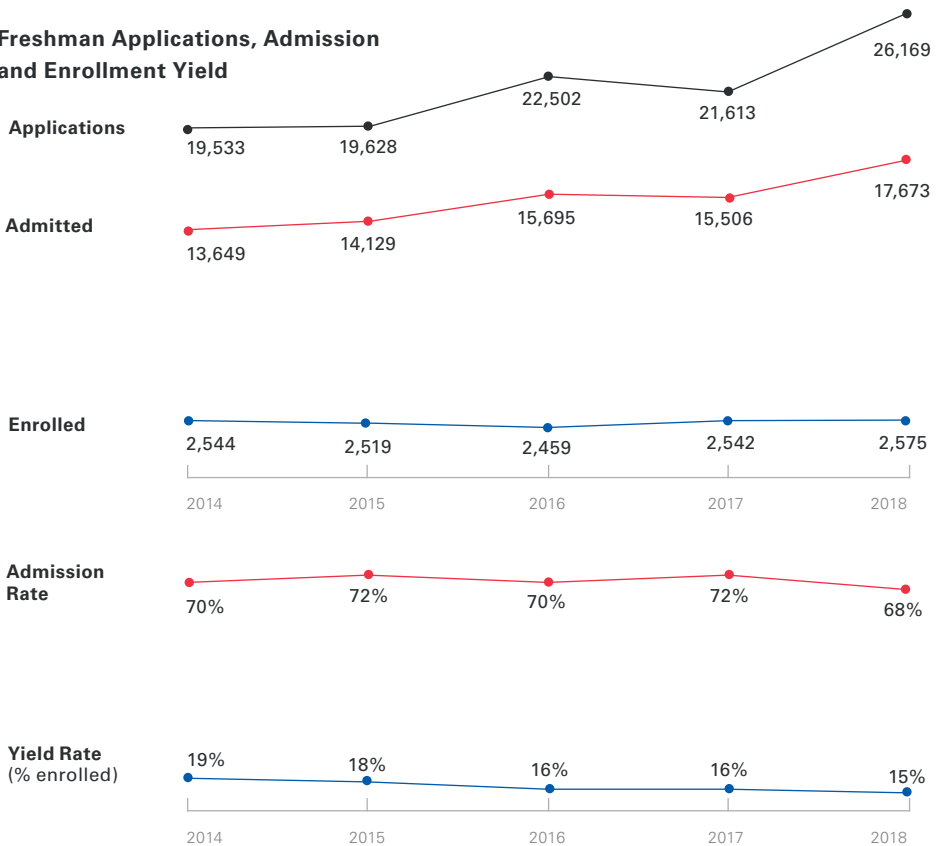

FRESHMAN ADMISSION TRENDS

DePaul received 26,169 freshman applications for fall 2018, an increase of 21 percent compared with 2017. A total of 3,711 students applied through the test-optional program, compared with 2,081 in 2017.

- » Applications to CDM, CSH, LAS and COE were up over 20 percent compared with 2017.
- » CSH received the most applications of any college with 7,499, or 29 percent of all applications.
- » 43 percent of applications came from outside Illinois; 30 percent were from Chicago suburbs and other parts of Illinois; 27 percent were from Chicago.
- » California, Michigan and Indiana provided the most out-of-state applications.

Freshman Applications, Admission and Enrollment Yield



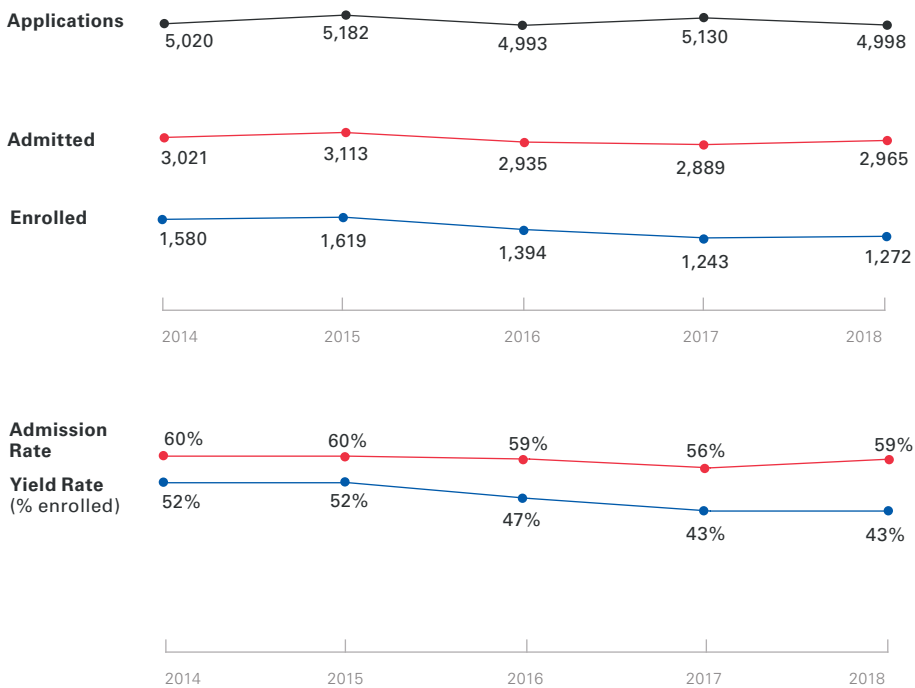

TRANSFER ADMISSION TRENDS

A total of 4,998 transfer students applied this year, compared with 5,130 in 2017. Applications increased in CDM, SNL and Theatre with declines in the other colleges. Applications to CDM now account for 17 percent of all transfer applications, compared with 14 percent in 2017. Despite a decline in overall transfer applications, new transfer enrollment increased by 2 percent from 2017 to 2018.

RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

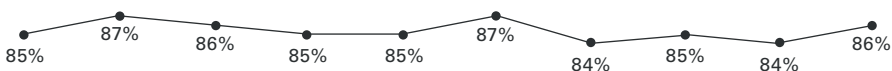
Returning in fall 2018 for their sophomore year are 86 percent of the fall 2017 full-time freshmen, compared with 84 percent of the prior year's freshman class.

The four-year graduation rate continues to exceed the national average for private four-year universities. This year, the four-year graduation rate for the 2014 freshman class was 58 percent, consistent with the last four years and 8 percentage points above the national average.

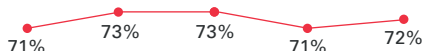
Of the fall 2012 full-time freshmen, 72 percent had graduated from DePaul six years later, up slightly from last year.

Freshman Retention and Graduation Rates

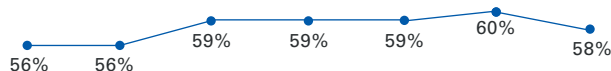
First-year Freshman Retention

Freshman Cohort Year

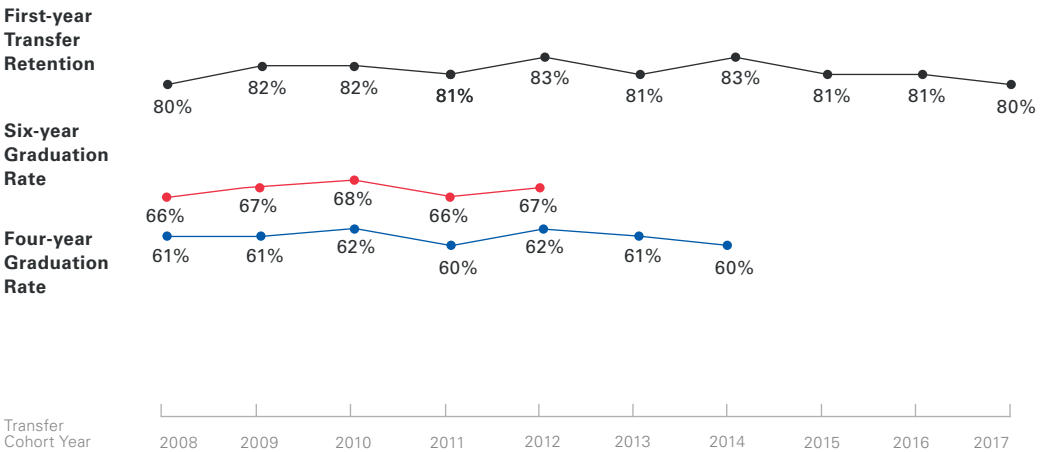

DEPAUL'S SIX-YEAR GRADUATION RATE EXCEEDS THE AVERAGE FOR FOUR-YEAR PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES NATIONALLY BY 12 PERCENTAGE POINTS.

The transfer one-year retention rate* captures the percentage of new transfer students from all terms of the prior year who return for the fall term. Because the methods for calculating freshman and transfer retention rates are different, the rates should not be directly compared.

The transfer retention and graduation rates have been relatively stable over recent years. This fall, the one-year retention rate is 80 percent. Sixty percent of students who transferred to DePaul during the 2014-15 academic year graduated within four years. The six-year graduation rate for students who transferred during the 2012-13 academic year is 67 percent.

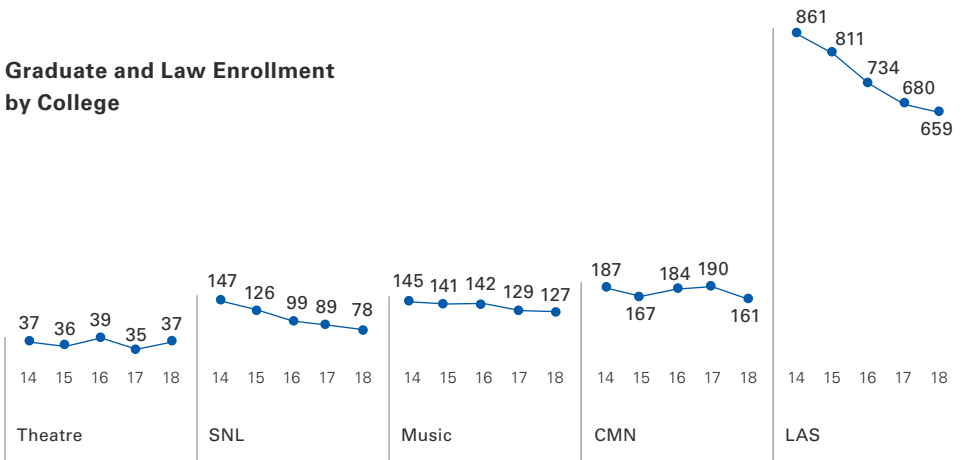
Graduate Enrollment

In fall 2018, a total of 7,136 graduate students enrolled (excluding Law), compared with 7,130 students in 2017. Graduate enrollment in KGSB (the largest graduate college), COE, CSH and Theatre increased in 2018, off-setting declines in the other colleges. A total of 90 percent of all graduate students are master's degree students, 8 percent are doctoral students, and 2 percent are in certificate programs or non-degree seeking.

- » 48 percent of all graduate students are 24 to 29 years old, comparable with 2014.
- » 35 percent are students of color (2,480 students), compared with 28 percent in 2014.
- » 55 percent are female, compared with 53 percent in 2014.
- » 67 percent are enrolled full time, taking eight or more credit hours per quarter, up from 61 percent in 2014. The majority of graduate students are enrolled full-time in all colleges, with the exception of SNL: Theatre (100 percent), CMN (82 percent), CSH (79 percent), COE (73 percent), KGSB (66 percent), LAS (65 percent), CDM (61 percent), and Music (58 percent). SNL is 19 percent.

Graduate and Law Enrollment by College



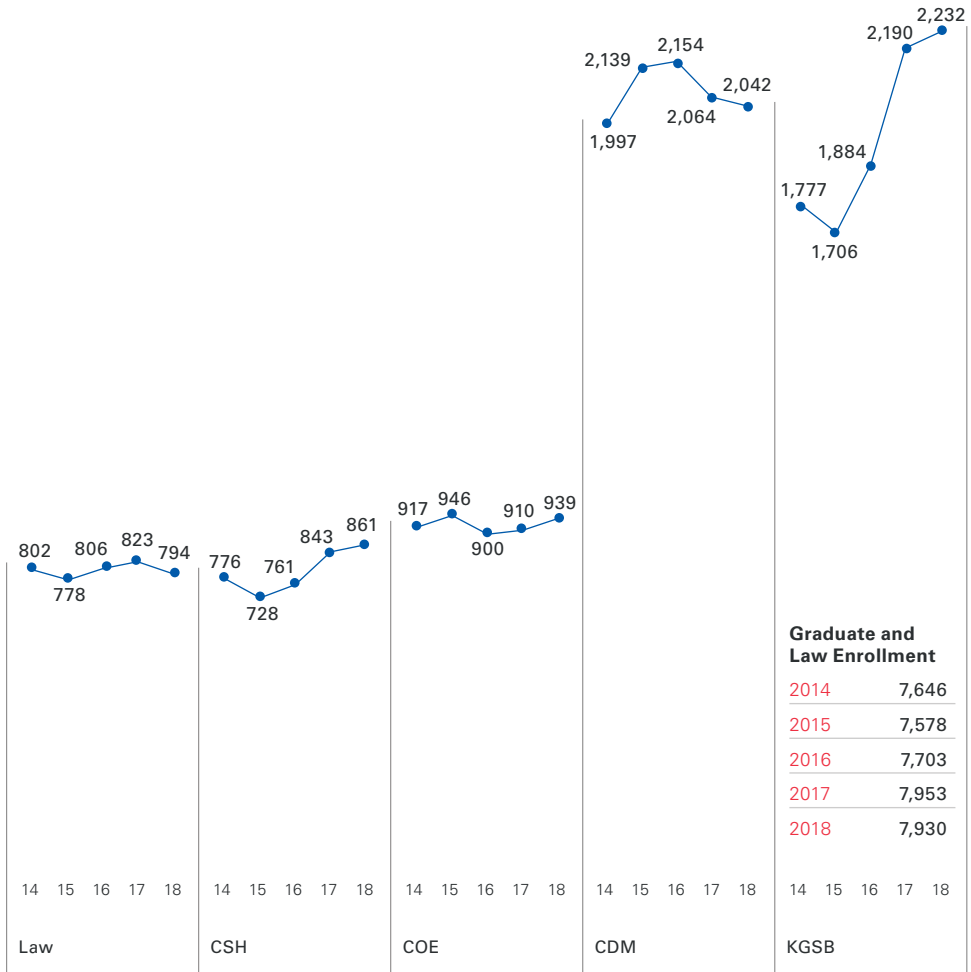
Law Enrollment

A total of 794 students enrolled in Law this fall, a 4 percent decline from 2017. Most law students are enrolled in the JD day program—76 percent—and 14 percent in the evening program, 9 percent in the Master of Jurisprudence (MJ) program and 2 percent in the LLM program.

- » 42 percent are originally from out of state or international locations (45 percent in 2014). Indiana, Michigan and California are the largest feeder states for current law students.
- » 54 percent are female (57 percent in 2014).
- » 30 percent are students of color (23 percent in 2014).
- » 21 percent are age 30 or older (12 percent in 2014).

NEW GRADUATE ENROLLMENT

New Master's Enrollment

A total of 1,658 new master's students enrolled in fall 2018, up 25 students from 2017.

- » 74 new master's students are enrolled in combined degree programs that allow students to complete their bachelor's degree and master's degrees together in five years, compared with 79 in 2017 and 59 in 2016.
- » 30 percent are under 24 (30 percent in 2017).
- » 36 percent are students of color (33 percent in 2017).
- » 14 percent are international students on F1 or J1 visas (14 percent in 2017).

The new master's students come from a wide range of locations:

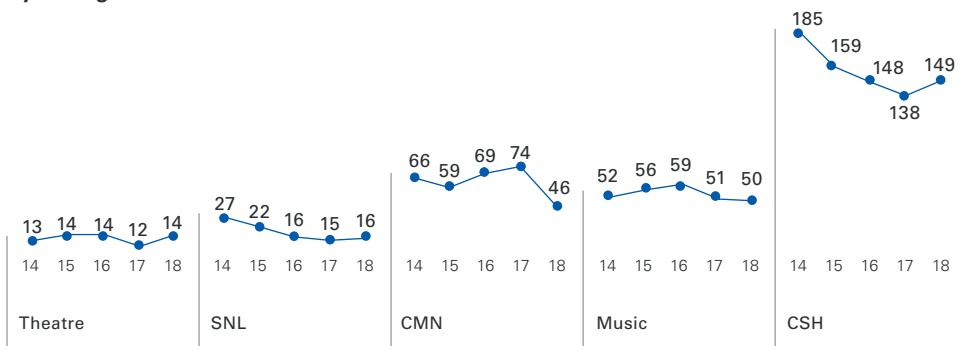
- » 37 percent are from suburban locations and elsewhere in Illinois (42 percent in 2017).
- » 38 percent are from the city of Chicago (36 percent in 2017).
- » 25 percent are from out of state and international locations (22 percent in 2017).

Fall enrollment accounts for roughly half of new master's enrollment throughout the fiscal year. Over the course of the 2017-18 fiscal year, a total of 2,969 new master's students enrolled, and 55 percent enrolled in the fall.

New Partnership Program Enrollment

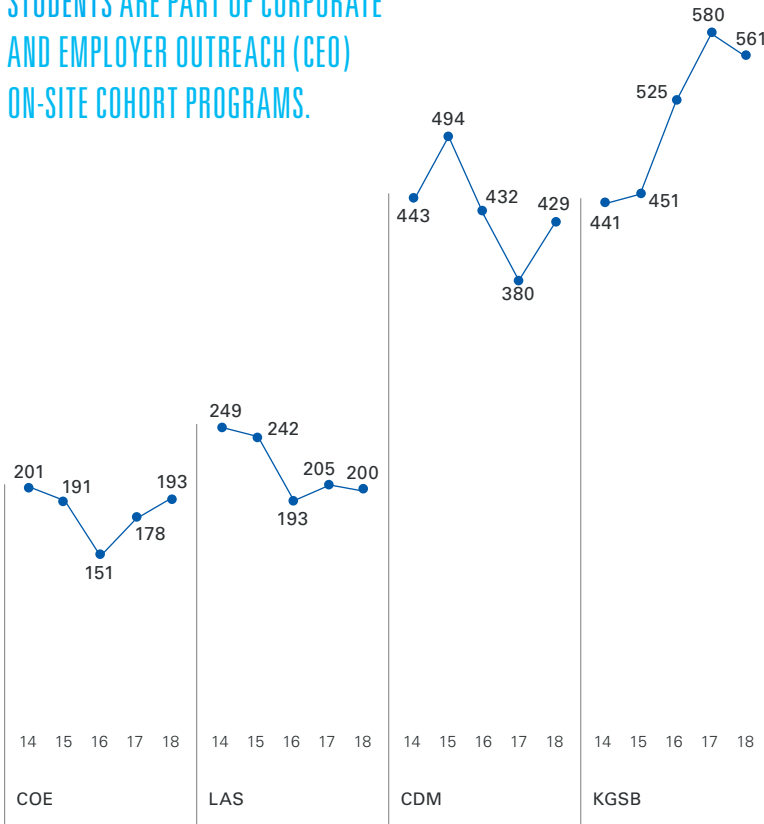
Since introducing the Corporate and Employer Outreach (CEO) program in 2014, DePaul has established 33 connections with Chicago companies. This fall, 112 new graduate students and 31 new law students enrolled through the CEO program in three on-site cohorts. In addition, 19 new transfer and another 34 new graduate students employed at a partner institution enrolled in one of DePaul's other academic programs.

New Doctoral Enrollment

A total of 87 new doctoral students enrolled this fall, compared with 103 in 2017. Thirty-six students are in COE, 23 students are in CSH (22 in the nursing doctorate), 14 are in the KGSB executive doctorate, 10 are in CDM and four are in LAS.

New Law Enrollment

Law welcomed 289 new students this fall, compared with 309 students in 2017. Of the new law students, 246 are enrolled in the JD, 37 are enrolled in the MJ, and 4 are in LLM programs.

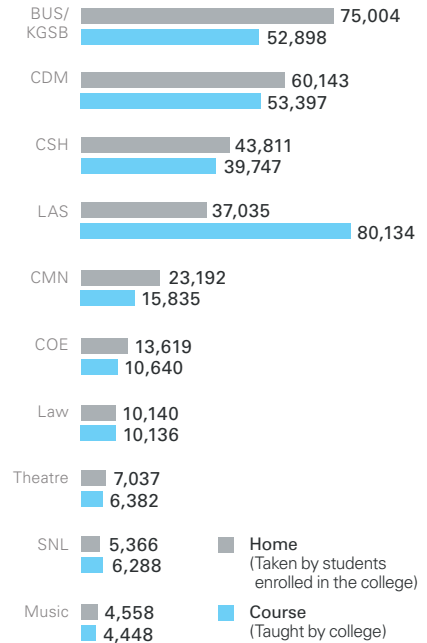

CREDIT HOUR DISTRIBUTION

Credit hours generated at the Lincoln Park and Loop campuses were equivalent in 2018 (42 percent from each campus). Online course credit hours increased to 33,565, up 2 percent compared with 2017, and account for 12 percent of all fall credit hours. Off-campus locations (including on-site partnerships, Cinespace, Harper College, Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science, study abroad and overseas hours) generated 11,336 hours in 2018, and account for 4 percent of all fall credit hours.

The proportion of students taking some online courses has increased from 13 percent in 2014 to 21 percent in 2018 (3,145 and 4,605 students, respectively), while the proportion of students taking exclusively online courses in the fall term has been relatively constant between 7 to 8 percent (1,759 and 1,835 students, respectively). Of undergraduate and graduate students enrolled exclusively online, most are enrolled part-time (83 and 63 percent, respectively) and are from the Chicago metropolitan area (84 and 65 percent, respectively).

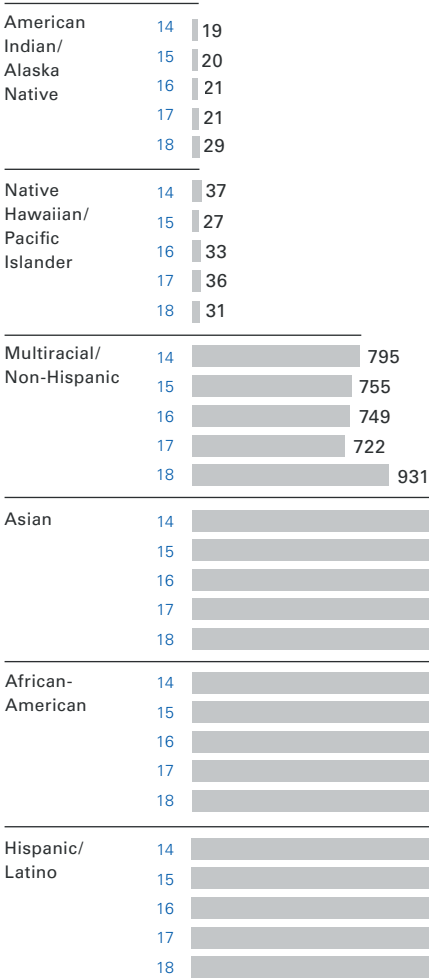

DePaul enrolled a record 8,710 students of color in 2018, compared with 8,544 in 2017. Students of color account for 39 percent of total enrollment, 41 percent of undergraduate enrollment, 35 percent of graduate enrollment and 30 percent of law enrollment.

International Students on F1 and J1 Visas

In total, 1,325 students have international student status (on F1 and J1 visas), compared with 1,467 in 2017. This year, one-third of international students are undergraduates, and two-thirds are graduate and law students. International students represent 6 percent of total university enrollment.

International Undergraduate Enrollment Trends

- » There are 454 undergraduate international students (or 3 percent of all undergraduates).
- » International students are enrolled in all colleges; nearly half enrolled in BUS (47 percent).
- » International undergraduates come from more than 75 countries. China is the largest source, accounting for more than one-third of international undergraduate students, followed by Saudi Arabia and India.

International Graduate and Law Enrollment Trends

- » A total of 871 international graduate and law students (or 11 percent of all graduate and law students) enrolled in 2018, compared with 984 in 2017. The largest proportion of these students enrolled in CDM and KGSB. Nineteen percent of CDM enrollment and 14 percent of KGSB enrollment is international students.
- » International graduate students come from about 70 countries, with more than a quarter from China, followed by Saudi Arabia and India.
- » International law students come from 13 countries. Canada, China and South Korea yield the most students.

NATIONAL COMPARISONS

DePaul is the largest private, not-for-profit university in the Midwest and the 14th-largest private institution nationally. DePaul has been the largest Catholic university in the nation for 21 consecutive years, having exceeded St. John’s University in total enrollment in 1998. DePaul enrolled 11 percent of the enrollment at the 15 largest Catholic institutions in 2018.

Enrollment at the largest Catholic institutions increased annually from 2014 to 2018. Enrollment increased by 3,671 students, or 2 percent, over that time. Almost half of this increase was between 2017 and 2018.
