Information on Possible Immigration Enforcement Activities in Chicago

Recent reports suggest that immigration enforcement activity may increase in the Chicagoland area. We understand that this news may be worrisome to some members of our community, especially our international community. We created this page to share relevant information with our community, and will update it as information changes.

What Immigration Enforcement Activities Are Happening In Chicago?

News outlets have reported that the Trump administration is ramping up U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) activity, including deportations, in the Chicagoland area (CBS News Sept. 10, 2025; USA Today Sept. 9, 2025).

Though President Trump has also signaled that he may send the National Guard to Chicago, other plans for the National Guard have been shared:

Therefore, it is unclear if and when the National Guard would come to Chicago, or what role they might play in immigration enforcement.

What Is DePaul Doing To Support International Students and Those Impacted By ICE Activity?

DePaul is supporting community members in many ways:

- DePaul leadership is closely monitoring the news and is prepared to update the community if ICE presence is confirmed on or around campus.
- DePaul leadership has sent and will continue to send messages to the community with updates and information about support services and guidance regarding obtaining accommodations.
- The Office of General Counsel published a website for <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> Related to <u>Immigration and Customs Enforcement Officers on DePaul University</u> <u>Property</u>, and has presented on this topic at Faculty and Staff Council.
- ISS staff are ensuring that international students and scholars meet the requirements of their immigration statuses. While the responsibility for maintaining status ultimately falls on the visa holder, ISS staff proactively reach out to students when a status issue is discovered to offer to help resolve the issue.

- Public Safety officers are trained to respond if federal law enforcement or ICE agents come to campus.
- Housing and Residence Life have trained professional and student staff to contact Public Safety should federal law enforcement come to residence halls.
- UCAPS held special walk-in hours on both campuses for students who have concerns about immigration enforcement.
- Mission and Ministry and UCAPS hosted drop-in sessions both in person and virtually to offer care and support to students concerned about immigration enforcement.

What Should I Do If I Learn A Student Was Detained By Ice?

Anyone who learns that a student was detained by ICE should immediately contact James Dorsett (312-362-5171) or Gretchen Frickx (312-362-6595). ISS has protocols in place for contacting family members, and providing support services and referrals.

What can members of the DePaul international community do to protect themselves?

- Carry your immigration documents with you. We recommend that students with immigration visas carry:
 - Passport
 - I-94 Arrival/Departure Record
 - o I-20 (F-1 students) or DS-2019 (J-1 students and scholars)
 - OPT EAD Card (if applicable)

A City Key Card, Illinois Driver's License or State ID alone does not verify your immigration status. Carrying original immigration documents will allow you to quickly provide definitive proof of your status, but it carries the risk of losing the documents. Carrying copies eliminates the risk that they will be lost, but increases the likelihood that the documents will be challenged. Individuals should weigh these risks when determining what to carry. If you carry a printed copy, then we recommend that you keep an encrypted digital scan of your passport page, visa, I-20/DS-2019, and I-94 on your phone.

• Leave a copy of your immigration documents with a trusted contact. Students should consider leaving a copy of their immigration documents with a trusted contact.

- Maintain your immigration status. Students should ensure that they understand and are complying with the requirements to maintain their valid visa status. For example, F and J international students must meet full-time enrollment requirements by the add/drop deadline. If you have any questions about your visa requirements, please contact your ISS advisor. ISS Advising is offered in-person as well as by Zoom, telephone and email. Your advisor is assigned based on the first letter of your last name. If you are unsure who your advisor is or how to contact them, visit our webpage. The ISS Front Desk is open Monday Friday 9:00 am 5:00 pm.
- Know your rights when engaging with law enforcement. Ensure that you understand your rights when engaging with law enforcement. You can learn about your rights here:

- Create a safety plan. We recommend that all international students have a safety plan in place for if they encounter ICE agents. Each person's safety plan will be different, but may include: identifying your emergency contacts and memorizing their phone numbers; identifying and/or retaining an attorney who will represent you if you are detained; and telling your contacts that if you are detained by ICE, then they can try to use ICE's online detainee locator to find you: https://locator.ice.gov/odls/#/search.
- Prepare For Travel. The Presidents' Alliance published a helpful Travel Emergency
 Preparedness Plan for guidance on what documents to carry, how to share
 information with trusted contacts, and other tips. Students should carefully
 consider whether they can safely travel outside of the United States, and monitor for
 any new travel bans or restrictions.
- Know how to contact DePaul Public Safety in case of emergency. If you experience an immigration-related emergency, immediately contact Public Safety at 773-325-7777. We recommend that you save this number in your phone contacts.
- Care for your physical, mental, and social health. Utilize <u>University Counseling</u>
 and <u>Psychological Services</u> or the <u>Division of Mission and Ministry</u> to support your
 mental and spiritual wellbeing. Stay socially connected through the <u>Office of</u>
 Student Involvement.

Be mindful of your social media and online presence. While immigration
authorities have been reviewing the online activity of international visitors to the
U.S. for many years, recent guidance from the U.S. Department of Homeland
Security has expanded the focus of these searches.

What Support Services Are Available to Students?

If you have concerns about attending classes, then you should reach out to your professors or contact leadership in DePaul's Student Government Association. We are asking our university community to be understanding and supportive during this uncertain time.
