A Note from the Inaugural Faculty Director of Tech Transfer, Commercialization & Social Impact

Tony Volini, Professor, College of Law.



Dear DePaul Community,

I'm looking forward to launching this new role, working with you to incentivize and reward faculty innovation. Before entering academia, I practiced law full-time as a patent attorney, handling inventions in a variety of technology areas (e.g., camera-guided surgical tools, extrusion dies). While practicing law, I at one point even found myself in the shoes of an inventor! (I'm an inventor on a <u>U.S. Patent</u> and its related foreign patents concerning an aerosol actuating technology for a Fortune 500 company.)

About twenty years ago, I left law practice for academia, to focus on teaching in various areas of intellectual property subjects (IP legal writing, patents, copyrights, IP licensing). In recent years, I branched out into interdisciplinary tech law education after completing my MS in Cybersecurity at DePaul, and now teach a data privacy course that is popular with both law students and college of computing students.

Conceptually, innovation begins with faculty saying I have an idea. So, our team will work to guide the idea to its next steps. For example, if the idea is curricular in nature, we can examine existing ways to connect faculty with corporate partners and consider any helpful improvements to grant or royalty structures to incentivize additional content creation. If it's a technology idea, we can educate faculty about protecting their rights regarding any imminent sales or public disclosures of an invention. We can explore potential commercialization partners for the technology, and, in some cases, even award funding for a patent application.

DePaul provides a unique partnership opportunity for faculty because, unlike some universities that own all employee IP, DePaul faculty can optionally enter into agreements with the university to drive mutually beneficial innovations. I am enthused to assist the university in my new role. It's exciting to think about the potential visibility and revenue that may flow from new faculty innovations consistent with the university's mission of fostering a vibrant academic environment that encourages intellectual curiosity and innovation.

Getting Started with Cayuse

We are excited to share that our new grants management platform, <u>Cayuse</u>, is live!

Cayuse houses the financial and administrative details of a sponsored project, including all the documents related to a proposal submission and ongoing management of an award. This allows everyone involved in the administration of the grant at any step in the process – from pre-submission routing for approval through award management – to be able to reference relevant information in a place that is easy to access. Cayuse also provides a convenient and robust tool to run reports about sponsored projects, allowing ORS staff to gain insight into larger trends at the university level and to better understand opportunities for growth and expansion.

Cayuse is already making things easier for PIs and administrators. With Cayuse as our new proposal routing system, reviewers can gain a more holistic view of the proposal when reviewing it for approval and feedback. As a grant goes through the submission process, Cayuse ensures the PIs and administrators can view its progress so that everyone involved can remain updated on the status.

Next up for our Cayuse implementation process will be to make the ongoing management and financial administration of an award more efficient through its Fund Manager program. This program is still being tested and will be rolled out for wider use in the future.

ORS offers a huge thanks to the staff in various departments throughout the university who have worked very hard to ensure that the system meets the needs of all users and makes the management of sponsored projects more efficient.

We look forward to working with you through Cayuse in the future and hope that it makes your experience working with grants here at DePaul more enjoyable overall!



New Open Access Publishing Opportunity

DePaul University Library has signed an open access publishing agreement with Cambridge University Press. Fees to publish open access in most <u>Cambridge</u> journals are now waived for DePaul authors.

AGENCY UPDATES

DePaul University recognizes the rapidly evolving nature of the federal funding landscape. In response, the Office of Research Services, Restricted Accounting, the Office of General Counsel, and the Office of the Provost are collaborating closely to assess and prepare for potential impacts on the university. Although grant terminations at DePaul remain rare, each project presents unique considerations and is being addressed on a case-by-case basis. Faculty and staff with questions or concerns about their specific awards are encouraged to contact the Office of Research Services for guidance and support.

NSF Updates

Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Programs (MFTRP): Starting on June 7, 2025, in accordance with the NSF Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG) Chapter II.D.l.e(ii), all PIs or co-PIs named on an NSF award made on or after May 20, 2024, must certify annually in Research.gov that they are not party to a Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Programs (MFTRP).

Indirect Cost Policy: NSF put the implementation of a new 15% indirect cost rate cap on hold while it was challenged in court by the Association of American Universities and other organizations and individual universities. A judge now has ruled in the plaintiffs' favor finding that NSF acted improperly by unilaterally making this change and that negotiated indirect cost rates should continue unchanged. Read more.

NIH Updates

DEI Certification on Grants: NIH has rescinded its notice which required recipients of new and renewal/continuation awards to certify that their institutions do not have DEI programs that violate federal civil rights laws.

- NOT-OD-25-090: RESCINDED Notice of Civil Rights Term and Condition of Award
- NOT-OD-25-124: Notice of Rescission of Civil Rights Term and Condition of Award

Foreign Subawards: The University has received advice that proposals with foreign subawards, submitted on or after May 1, will be administratively withdrawn and not considered. It is advisable to submit proposals without foreign subawards or postpone proposals involving foreign subawards until NIH releases new, to-be-developed NOFOs. For now, ORS suggests that researchers discuss any questions with proposals with foreign subawards with their Program Officer.

All Agencies

Open Access - Grant Funded Public Access Mandates: The majority of federal government and private funders require that grantees make their peer-reviewed publications publicly available. Additionally, many funders also require that the data from the grant funded work must also be released. You can find information about the meaning of Open Access, OA resources, and the OA publishing process across the multiple federal and private funders with current policies in place on the <u>DePaul University Library website</u>.


Paid Leave Program Workshop
