

Summer Research Application Comprehension and Outcomes

Were students able to articulate and perform the necessary steps to select, apply, and secure a summer undergraduate research experience?

Learning Outcome

- Students who participate in TRiO Pathways should be able to demonstrate knowledge regarding the fundamentals of academic research and how it relates to graduate education.

Methodology

- 14 out of 19 student scholars in the junior cohort who were required to apply to 2019 summer research opportunities (SROPs) were selected to participate in this assessment.
- Data were collected using internally-created question prompts integrated into existing Qualtrics surveys distributed at the end of Winter 2019.
- Internally-created rubrics were used to measure student learning for each question prompt on the survey.
- Additional data were collected during Spring 2019 related to how many students applied to and were accepted in an SROP.

Demographics

- Student scholars are eligible for the McNair program because they are classified as either low-income and first generation or members of underrepresented groups defined by the U.S. Department of Education as American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino or Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander.
- Of the 14 scholars identified to participate in this project, 13 students (93%) provided data through the survey component of the assessment.

Key Findings

- 9 out of 13 scholars (69%) successfully demonstrated their ability to articulate the necessary steps to select a summer undergraduate research experience from the survey prompts.
- 12 out of 13 scholars (92%) successfully demonstrated their ability to articulate the necessary steps to apply to a summer undergraduate research experience from the survey prompts.
- 12 out of 14 scholars (86%) successfully demonstrated their ability to perform the necessary steps to select, apply to, and secure a summer undergraduate research experience.

Plan of Action

- Incorporate one-on-one meetings with the Research Coordinator at the end of fall quarter to review SROP options and reinforce seminar comprehension of selecting an SROP.
- Reinforce seminar comprehension of requirements of an SROP application during autumn quarter one-on-one meetings.
- Restructure the programming timeline to allow for earlier introduction of seminar material on SROPs, review of application materials and allow extra time to integrate the above recommendations.
