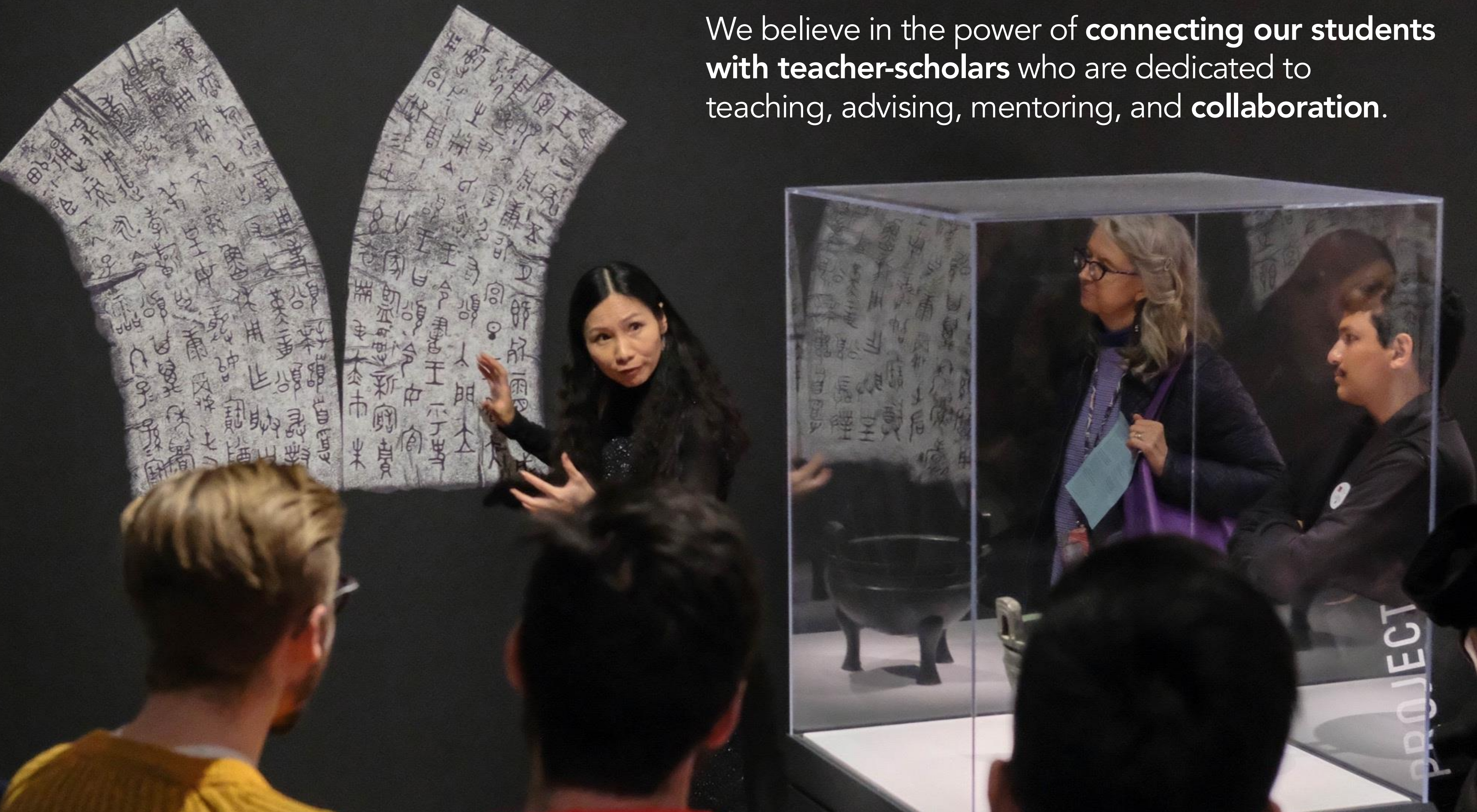

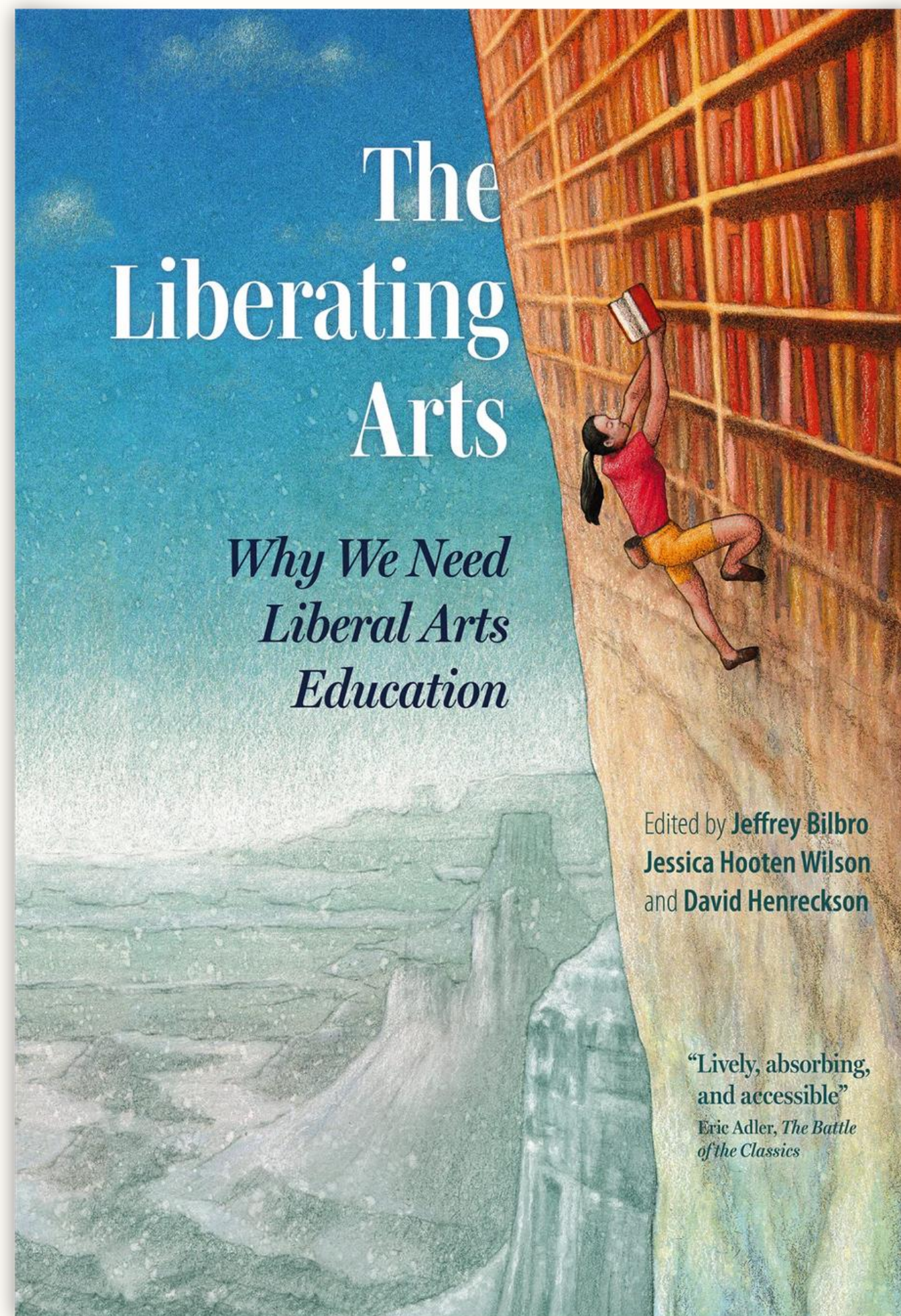
- A college major in a subject like finance or computer science is often touted as the ticket to a well-paying position in good times and bad, and that is mostly true.

DePaul's Experiential Humanities Collaborative



Funded by the Mellon Foundation, HumanitiesX supports collaboration between **faculty, community partners, and students** by creating new courses that blend humanities inquiry with project-based learning, engaging students in and with Chicago communities.

HX 2023-2024: Democracy & Rights

Historical Memory Project: Ni Olvido, Ni Perdón



Professors Lydia Saravia and Susana Martínez worked with community partner Chicago Religious Leadership Network to examine the ways organized communities in Central America have worked with human rights groups in the US to document and understand past injustices. Students explored how local activists/artists participate in political movements and preserve historic memory, putting these lessons to work in a culminating and interactive public art event.

DO SAY GAY: Banned Books and LGBTQ+ Freedoms



Professors Barrie Borich and Heather Montes Ireland partnered with Gerber/Hart LGBTQ+ Library and Archives to explore the role of LGBTQ+ libraries in preserving queer history and community. Students studied theory about censorship, LGBTQ+ rights, and democracy while reading banned books about LGBTQ+ lives and working towards a final, collaborative exhibition.

Professors David Lay Williams and Matt Maguire partnered with Alliance Française de Chicago to examine the role of Alexis de Tocqueville's Democracy in America today. Students participated in civic activities across the quarter while conducting a close reading of Tocqueville's text and working towards an end-of-quarter public panel with Tocqueville scholars and community archivists.

Professors Li Jin and Phillip Stalley worked with community partner Sophia's Choice, to explore how Chinese artists, writers, and scholars have interpreted, portrayed, and confronted environmental degradation in China. Students hosted a public film-screening event and poster session, followed by a Q&A with the film's editor.

About

Each year, HumanitiesX offers 4-6 paid student fellowships to undergraduate or graduate students who are pursuing [a degree or minor in DePaul's College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences](#). Applicants must have notable school, work, or personal experience both in the humanities and related to one or more of the pressing social challenges evoked in our HumanitiesX themes: Immigration and Migration, The Environment: Crisis and Action, and Democracy and Rights.

Student Fellows learn about the public humanities, support faculty and community partner teams as they develop new [HumanitiesX courses](#), and create public-facing writing and public humanities deliverables for audiences at DePaul and beyond.

Student fellows are paid for 8-10 hours of work per week and must be available for the full term of the fellowship, which runs from the spring quarter through the autumn quarter, including the summer.





student urban research corps



Student Urban Research Corps (SURC) members work as part of the multidisciplinary Urban Collaborative and participate in **data collection, management, and analysis, including the creation of data visualizations**, for community-based studies and projects.

The SURC provides up to **15 students project-based opportunities for hands-on experience working with community partners in need**. The SURC gives students a unique opportunity to use their technical and analytical skills to support these community partners while also building real-world experience.

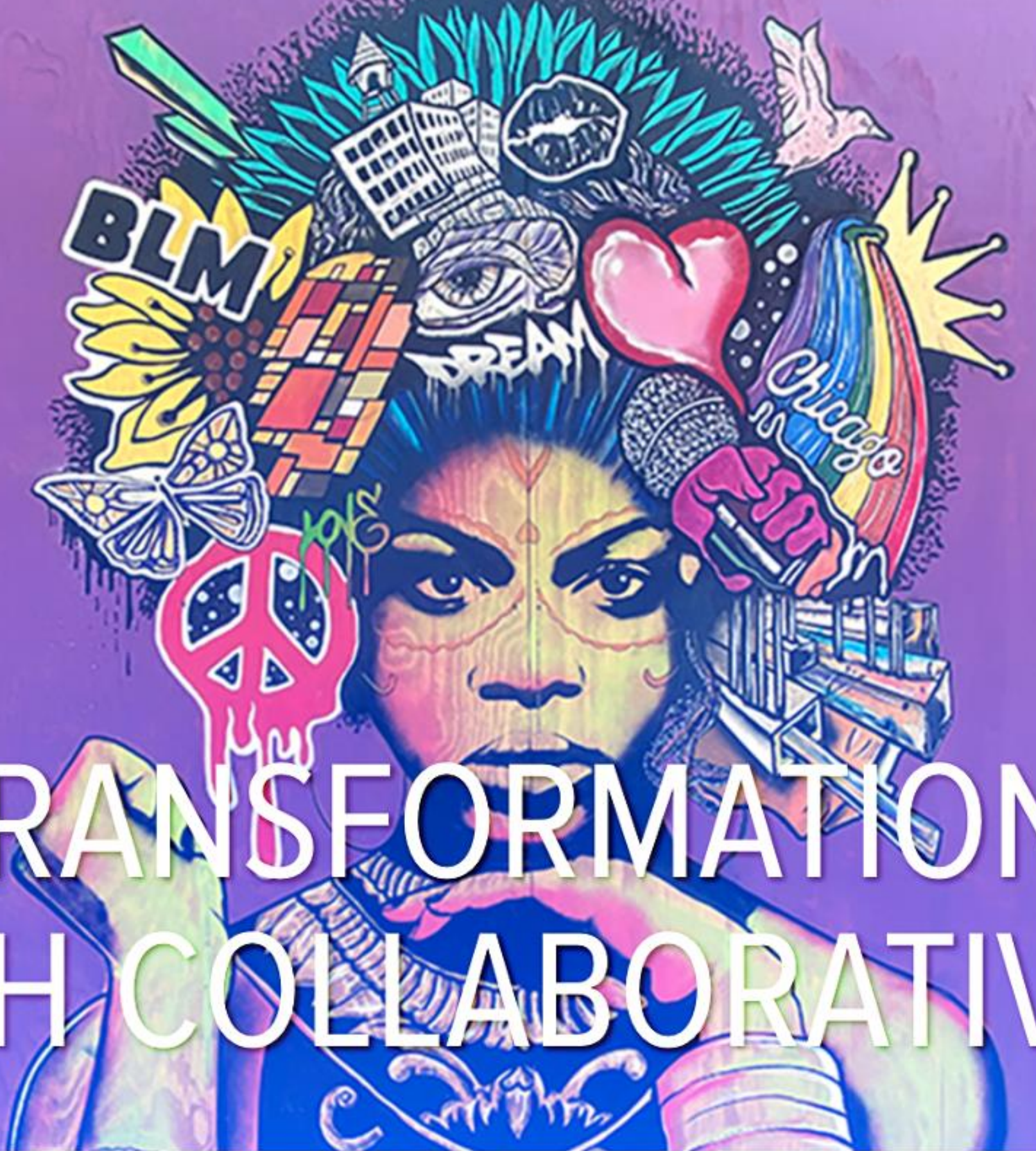
The Translator and Interpreter Corps (TIC) gives students with proficiency in at least one foreign language the opportunity to provide **translation and interpreting services to clients** in need across Chicagoland and beyond.

TIC student employees use their language skills in the service of others, help break down language barriers and build bridges between cultures, and develop competencies that will serve them professionally post-graduation.

All students at DePaul are welcome to join in our public events and are encouraged to participate in STRC's intellectual community.

The STRC also offers two types of fellowships for students majoring or minoring in the College of LAS who are interested in doing independent research about the histories and cultures of people of color: the STRC Graduate Fellowship (SGF) and the STRC Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF). Students Fellows will benefit from focused academic and professional mentoring, networking with peers and faculty within the STRC, and the chance to learn more about how the humanities can help build a more just and equitable society.

Student Fellowship Opportunities

Undergraduate Research Fellowship

The STRC Undergraduate Fellowship will provide six undergraduate students with a stipend and free tuition to attend a 5-week Summer Session I course, taught by one LAS faculty member, which will introduce them to basic research methodologies in the interdisciplinary humanities. Fellows will present their research at the STRC Annual Fall Symposium.

The STRC will award multiple Graduate Fellowships to MA students in the College of LAS whose primary scholarly or creative field lies within the humanities related to the histories, legacies, and/or cultures of people of color in the United States or in diaspora. 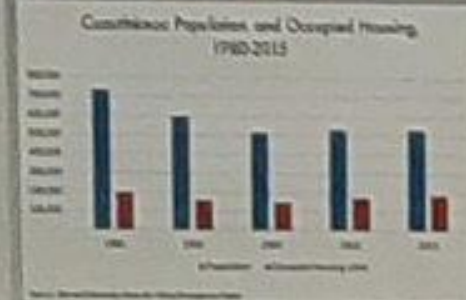
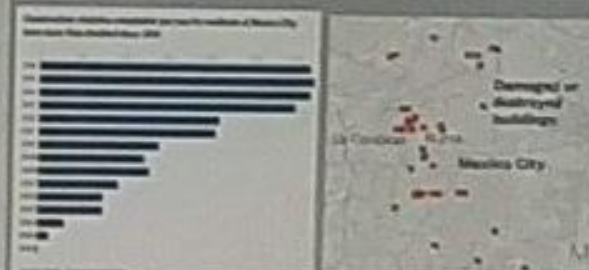

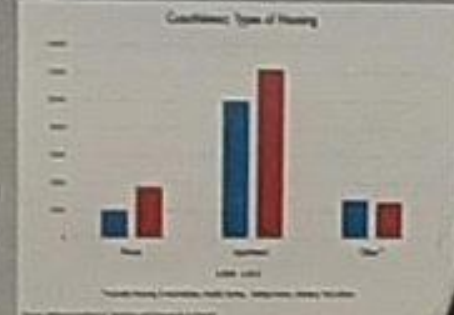
Disaster Capitalism: "The practice by a government taking advantage of a major disaster to adopt liberal economic policies that the population would be less likely to accept under normal circumstances." (Naomi Klein, 2007)

Complaints & Violations:
In 2016 alone, Mexico City residents lodged one thousand-two and hundred seven complaints about violations of zoning or land use ordinances with the Environmental and Zoning Prosecutor's Office.

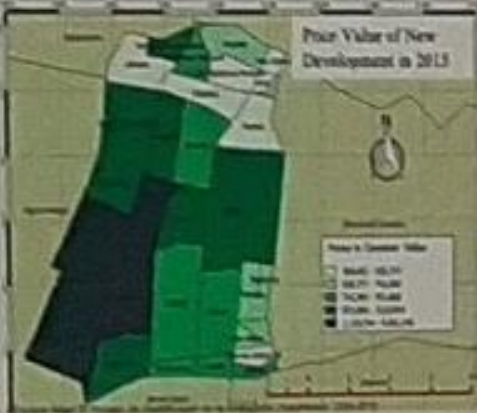


Bando dos policy intensified pressure on the city center

- Increase in average property cost prices by thirty to fifty percent.
- Low-income residents, faced soaring rents.
- The rise in population and new real estate development increased building density in the central city.
- Eighty percent of Cuauhtémoc delegation ended up in the hands of fourteen real estate agents.



From 2000 to 2015, both population and housing increased in the area covered by Bando dos.



The predominance of downward mobility could signify a gentrification process.



1985

Caused a decline of population in city center and an increase of population in suburbs.

1991-1994

NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Government sponsored initiatives with the private sector to recuperate and preserve the Historic Center. Incentives for businesses returning to the city center. Restored and relocated street vendors.

2000

BANDO DOS

A policy to encourage the private sector to repopulate the city center. The policy required housing by private developers.

FIRST MAJOR EARTHQUAKE (8.1 magnitude)

Cuauhtémoc Delegation experienced damaged sector. Two hundred and fifty-eight buildings collapsed. Revealed government unpreparedness for earthquake risk prevention. Requested offers of international aid. Weak response time. Risk of chaos resulting from many structures left abandoned.

- 2) To offer support to faculty engaged in the above activities consistent with the university's belief and commitment to the pursuit of knowledge.

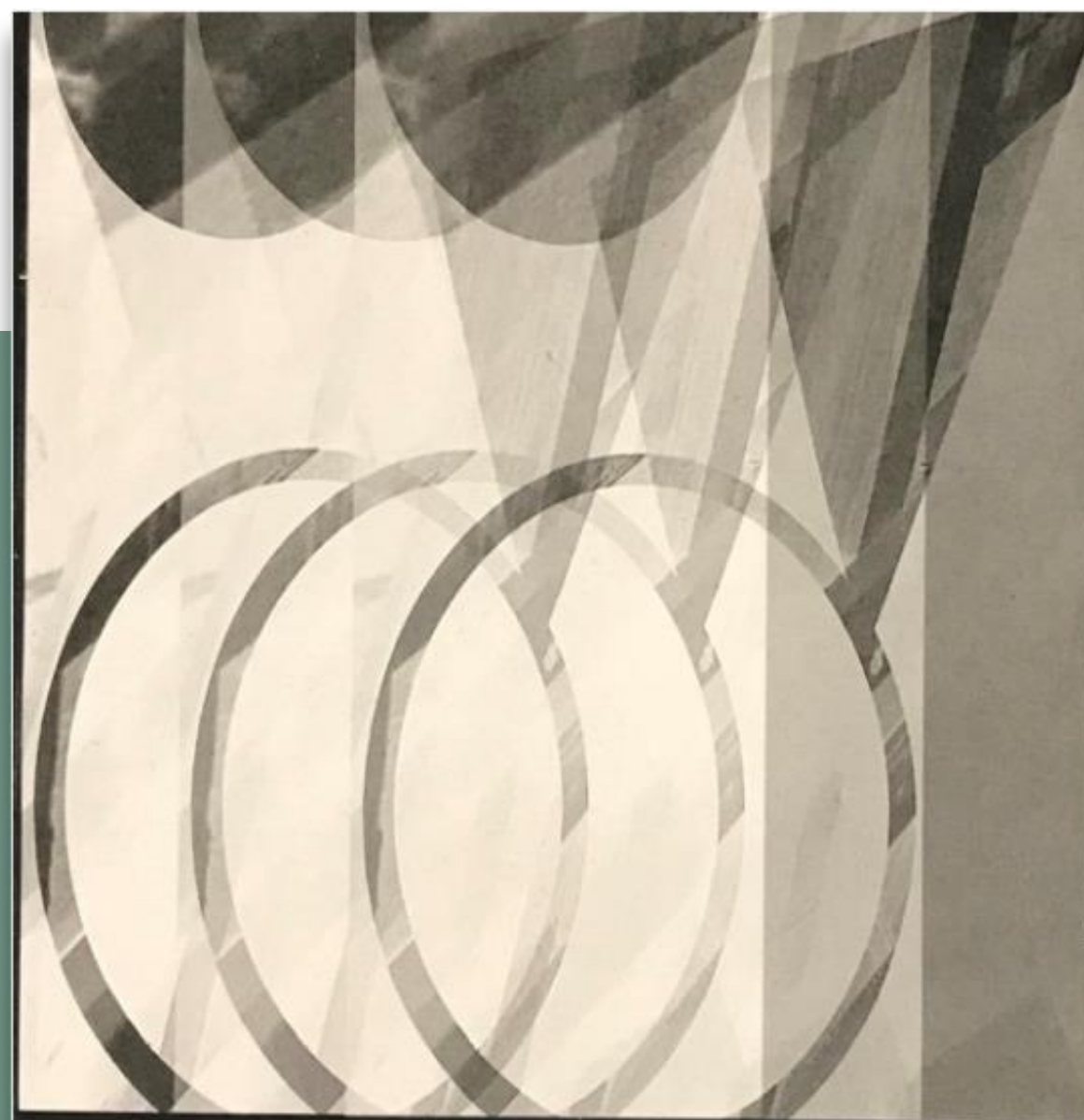
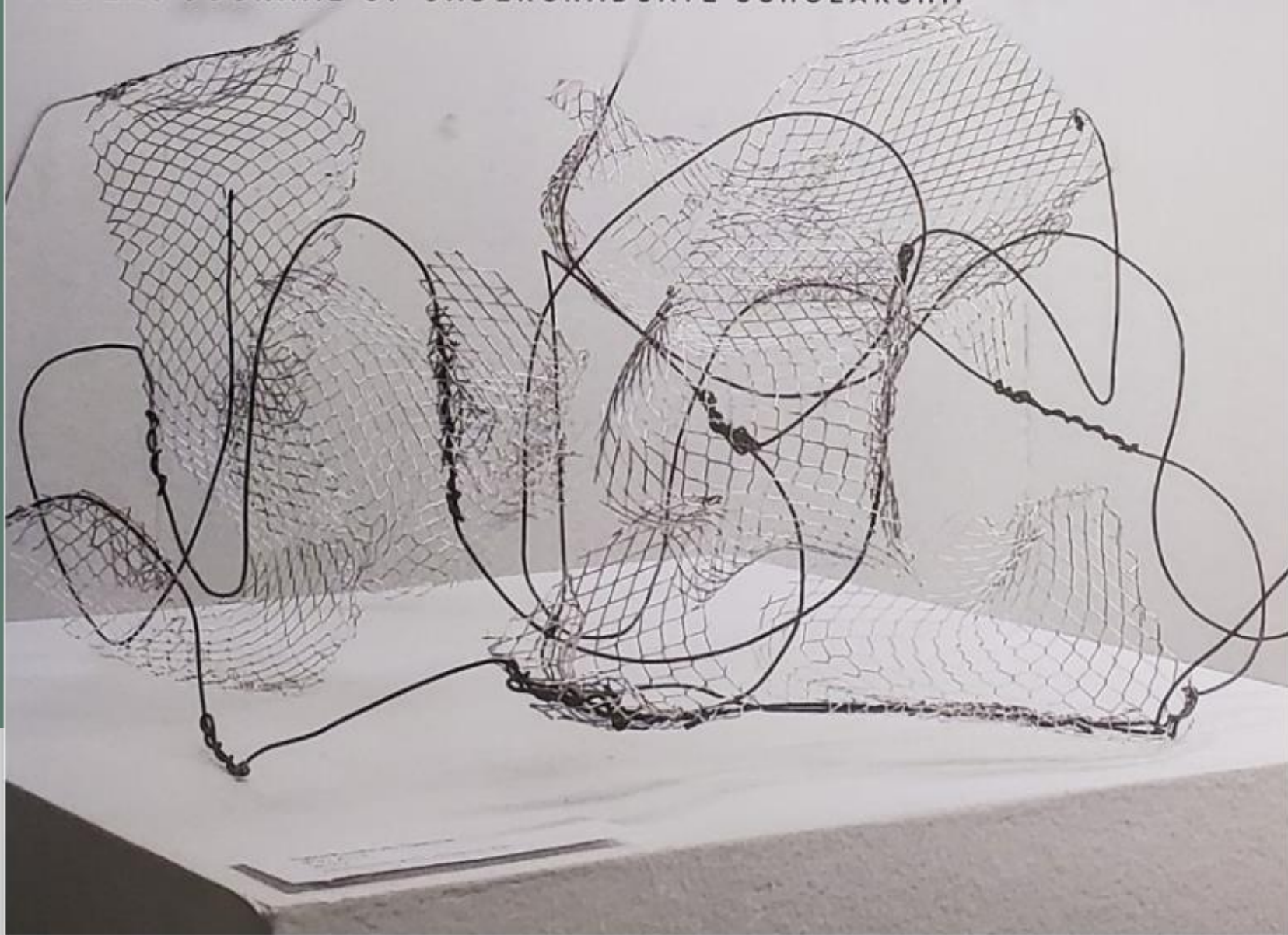
Interested faculty and students can apply together for the URAP program twice per year (Fall and Spring) using the specific deadlines set by each College.

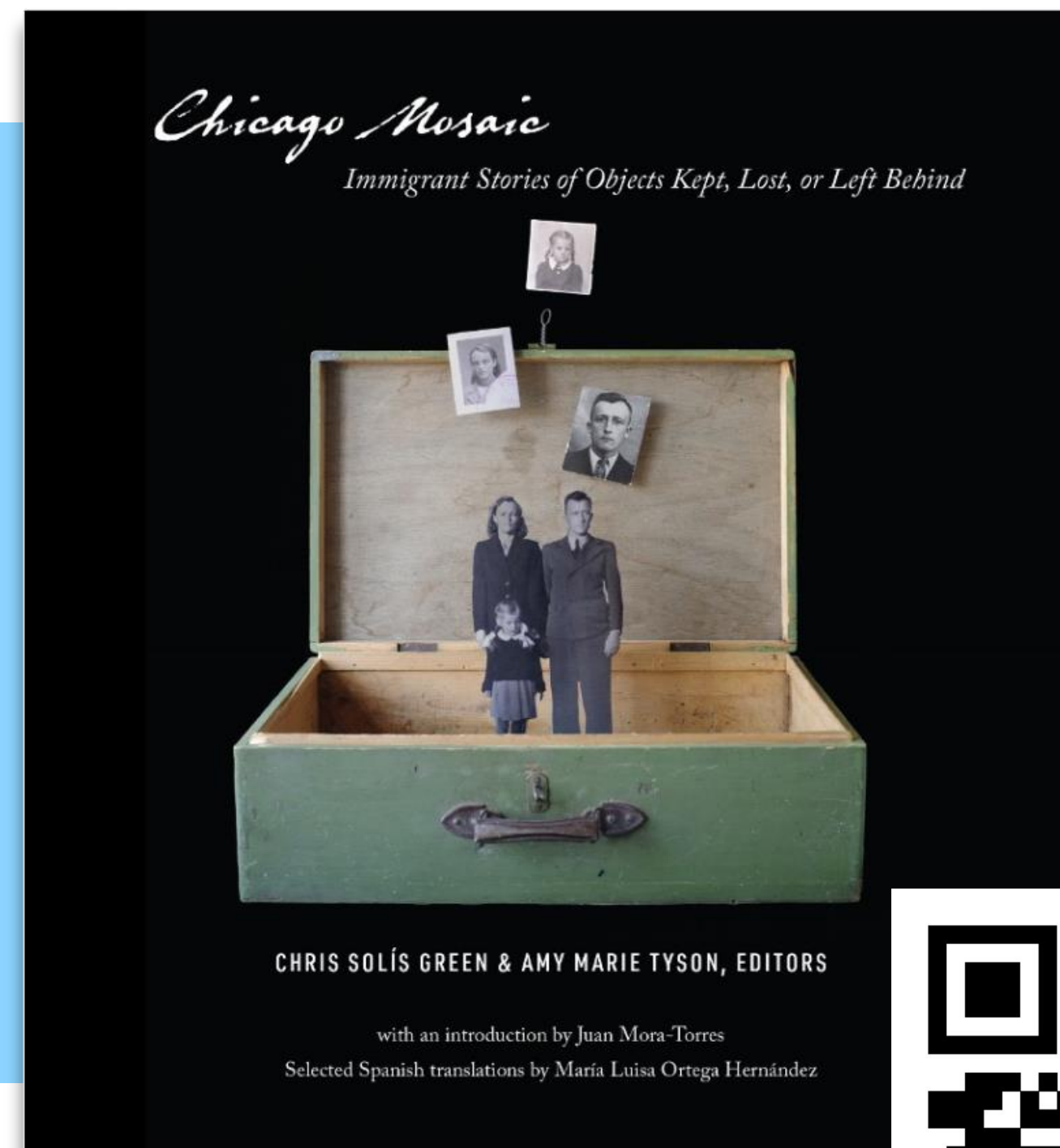
